The Disaster Recovery Coalition of America applauds the introduction of the bipartisan Resilient America Act (Act), which provides stronger tools for FEMA to continue to lead the nation's risk-reducing disaster mitigation and resilience programs. This legislation is fundamental to increasing communities' resilient infrastructure planning that can reduce Mother Nature's devastation from the impacts of wildfire, damaging hurricanes, flood, earthquake, and other costly catastrophes.
